Module area	<b>A Intercultural Anglophone Studies in Literature and Language – Foundations</b>

Content	<p><b>Seminar A 1</b> “Theoretical Approaches to Language, Variation and Culture” focuses on key concepts and critical terminology in contemporary research on the global uses of English in a variety of different cultural contexts and media, on the history of their emergence, structural developments and pragmatic differences; it prepares students for the application of theoretical insights into the analysis of spoken and written linguistic data.</p> <p><b>Seminar A 2</b> “Core Issues” furthers students’ theoretical and methodological skills by addressing a topic centrally related to the inter- and transcultural core concept of “diversity” in language. Discussions of its historical, social and cultural-cognitive meanings and effects will be applied to Englishes in various social, cultural, institutional and medial contexts.</p> <p><b>Übung A 3</b> “Style and Register” enhances the ability to write complex academic texts in English, with adequate command of style and register.</p> <p><b>Seminar A 4</b> “Elective Seminar I” allows students to develop their knowledge of language structure as well as the regional, social and cultural diversity of language usage. It can be chosen from the range of seminars offered in the fields of English Linguistics and other Anglophone Studies.</p> <p><b>Course A 5</b> “Seminar/Lecture/Workshop” addresses questions pertaining to the cultural development of the various Anglophone regions of the world from a wider range of perspectives, including interdisciplinary and comparative perspectives. It also serves to broaden students’ knowledge base concerning the various English language contexts and cultures. Courses can be chosen from linguistics and literary studies (including Anglophone Studies, German, African, Romance and Arabic Studies), media studies, history, sociology, geography and other disciplines.</p>

Learning Objectives	Module area A consists of 5 interlinked classes that together are designed to (1) secure a solid grounding in linguistic theory and in some of the field's central methodologies and current debates; (2) guide students to independently apply these theories and methods; (3) enhance their ability to write academic texts in English; and (4) provide early orientation as to the scope, interconnections, and possible future specialization in the areas of Anglophone language studies and the inter- and transcultural processes involved in the global contexts of the use of English.

Content	<b>Courses / Option B 1</b> serve to acquire and consolidate the oral and writing skills in the chosen language <b>Courses / Option B 2</b> serve to acquire, consolidate and improve the student's oral and writing skills in the chosen language <b>Courses / Option B 3</b> serve to improve and expand the student's oral and writing skills in the chosen language

Learning Objectives	Module area B is designed to help acquire, consolidate, and improve the ability for oral and written communication in the chosen language, at the level of skill which can be obtained in the type of course taken (either “Grundkurs,” “Aufbaukurs,” or “Spezialisierungskurs”).
Prerequisite	Willingness to acquire or improve one's skills in the chosen language. <u>Note:</u> A module already validated with credits in an undergraduate program cannot be validated again in a graduate program.

Content	<b>Seminar C 1</b> “Intensive Seminar I” and <b>Seminar C 2</b> “Intensive Seminar II” consolidate the theoretical and methodological knowledge acquired in Module A and intensify the application of analytical and interpretative skills by addressing further core concepts of linguistic intercultural Anglophone studies such as inter- and transcultural perspectives of written and spoken communication (C 1) and diversity, diaspora and globalism (C 2) as they pertain to the study of English language contexts. <b>Seminar C 3</b> “Elective Seminar II” allows students to further broaden their knowledge about language structure as well as the regional and social diversity of language usage. It may also serve to gradually develop a topical specialization. It can be chosen from the range of seminars offered in the fields of English Linguistics and other Anglophone Studies.

	<p><b>C 4 Independent Studies I</b>  “Independent Studies I enables students to further expand their theoretical and methodological knowledge, their skills of analyzing linguistic data, and their knowledge about a specific area of linguistic studies by developing a topic for a 4-hour written exam</p>
Learning Objectives	<p>Module area C consists of 3 interlinked classes and the written exam and is designed to</p> <p>(1) consolidate knowledge in linguistic theory basic to the field of Anglophone studies and strengthen students’ independent application of methodological skills; particular emphasis is given to the relevance of core concepts such as inter- and transcultural perspectives of written and spoken communication, diversity, diaspora and globalism in English language contexts.</p> <p>(2) broaden students’ knowledge of the scope, interconnections, and possible future specialization in the area of English Linguistics in its specialization area within Intercultural Anglophone studies.</p>
Prerequisite	<p>Completion of Module area A; students should demonstrate a solid theoretical and methodological grounding, deepened knowledge of the linguistic structural and intercultural analytical core concept of “diversity” and of the social, cultural and regional diversity of English language usages.</p>

Content	<p><b>Seminar D 1</b> “Advanced Seminar I” strengthens students’ theoretical and methodological understanding acquired in Modules A and C, placing emphasis on methods of eliciting and analysing English language data.</p> <p><b>Seminar D 2</b> “Advanced Seminar II” further expands students’ knowledge of the history and variety of an inter- or transcultural approach acquired in Modules A and C by focusing in a concentrated and exhaustive way on one central theoretical sociolinguistic, text linguistic, anthropological or pragmatic approach in the realms of English language contexts.</p> <p><b>D 3 Independent Studies II</b>  “Independent Studies II” enables students to further expand their theoretical and methodological knowledge, their analytical skills, and their knowledge about several linguistic fields by developing three topic areas for a 60-minute oral exam. The topic areas can be developed from classes taken in module D as well as in modules A and C.</p>
Learning Objectives	<p>Module area D is designed to</p> <p>(1) further strengthen students’ capabilities in terms of an informed theoretical approach and independent application of methodological skills to obtaining and working with empirical English linguistic data in the fields of sociolinguistic, text linguistic, anthropological and pragmatic approaches to language analysis.</p> <p>(2) further expand students’ knowledge of the specificities of inter- and transcultural approaches in the fields of linguistic Intercultural Anglophone studies.</p>
Prerequisite	<p>Completion of Module areas A and C; students should demonstrate enhanced analytical and interpretive skills, based on a consolidated theoretical and methodological basis. They should demonstrate a broadened knowledge of the social, regional and cultural diversity of English language contexts.</p>

Content	<p><b>Seminar E 1</b> “Master Seminar” supports students with the independent writing of their Master thesis by discussing the project in terms of its contextualization in the relevant research contexts, in terms of its theoretical and methodological approach, and in terms of structuring the thesis.</p> <p><b>E 2 Master Thesis</b> The Master Thesis (23.000 to 30.000 words) demonstrates the student’s ability to independently address a chosen, circumscribed topic in English linguistics. It pursues a pertinent theoretical and methodological and empirical approach, documents comprehensive knowledge of related research, and develops a coherent argument in appropriate academic language. Learning Objectives	Module E is designed to support the students in terms of developing, structuring, and writing their MA Thesis.
Prerequisite	Completion of modules A, B, C, D; students should demonstrate their capability for an independent, theoretically informed and empirically based analysis of English language data, developing an intercultural perspective.
